Growth Through Trials of Covid-19

A challenging year in 2020 left us unsure of what 2021 would bring, yet we were hopeful. **Spring of 2021** programs began to grow in size from previous years as families desired normalcy in their lives again. This change meant high enrollment in the second quarter of our fiscal year. Parents knew the risk of jumping into classes amidst Covid, yet with our health and safety precautions in place we were able to overcome and push towards success within our Spring 2021 Programming. Still no sign of afterschool programming we focused on our YMCA and Adaptive programs.

Summer 2021 felt normal again. We came back with a boom as Summer Camps were full and overflowing with waitlists. We had a record breaking number of Summer Camps and students. Although, we still worked around cancellations with Covid outbreaks among teachers, students, and partnering sites.

Fall 2021 was more than we hoped or imagined. We experienced the highest YMCA enrollment numbers, after school programs started back, flash mobs returned in full swing, and Adaptive programs grew from years past in the Upstate of SC.

Our organization has always desired to expand within other parts of the Carolinas and that dream

became a reality in 2021 as we created a Raleigh, NC branch. This expansion started with our YMCA program where we saw tremendous growth in a short period. This has already led to multiple branches in the Triangle of NC being added for 2022. This growth also meant additional employees both within Raleigh and Greenville as well as restructuring our previous models. Our team has doubled in size and we are guided by additional new board members who have paved the way for our success.

We have been grateful for continued government funding on state and national levels. A select number of local foundations have also granted us relief & operational funds as well as programmatic grants. These grants were used this year to bring back many of our projects with at-risk children in after school programs and continue to serve under-resourced students in Greenville county and beyond.

Thank you for your involvement, your support, and your generosity this past year. Join us in celebrating the work that CDC has done in 2021 to restore our organization not just back to normal operations but to growth.






